MARKET OVERVIEW

First quarter low-rise new home sales amounted to a total of 5,480 sales.
Total Market Area (TMA) March sales are up 59% compared to the previous month and marked the highest monthly sales in the last seven years.

The strong performance was especially noticeable from new openings and releases, particularly in the affordable townhome

segment which is significantly gaining larger market share.

Examples of strong sales are Regal Crest Homes in Mayfield Village, Brampton; Royal Pine Homes in Spring Valley, Brampton; Geranium Homes in Friday Harbour, Innisfil; Mattamy Homes in Hawthorne South Village, Milton; and Brookfield Homes in Willow Glen, Tottenham.

Save money on air conditioning this summer

The warm, sultry temperatures of summer are coming and with them, a high energy bill! But using your air conditioner to cool your home doesn't have to break the bank.

eieihome.com spoke with Wayne Palmer, co-owner of George Kent Home Improvement, about ways to beat the heat without breaking your wallet.

Keep air filters clean. A dirty air filter means your air conditioner will run less efficiently, causing it to use more energy. Palmer recommends checking your air conditioner's filter at the start of the summer season and replacing it if it's dirty.

Air filters typically last three months (our typical summer), but if your air conditioner is running from June well into September, you may want to have an extra filter on hand.

Use a programmable thermostat. A programmable thermostat can reveal the largest energy savings by allowing you to turn up your air conditioner two or three degrees while you're out of the house at work or while you're away at the cottage for a week.

Palmer recommends setting the temperature down an hour before you're set to arrive home so your home's temperature is comfortable when you arrive. You can also set your thermostat to increase the temperature of your home in the evening.

"You don't need the same level of cooling as when you're awake and you won't notice ing o living if your home is a few degrees agair

warmer," says Palmer.

Close basement vents. The basement is the coolest part of your home and doesn't need a lot of cool air pumped into it. "Hot air rises, so you want that cold air to be pushed up through your house to cool down the main living areas," says Palmer.

The cool air will then come down to the basement from the bedrooms and main floor. To close off basement air vents, purchase magnetic strips that fit on top of the vent.

Avoid furniture obstructions. To maximize your home's

efficiency, you may want to rearrange your furniture to ensure it doesn't obstruct any of your home's cooling vents.

If you do have a couch placed over top of a vent, you can use a deflector to direct the air coming out of the vent into the main living space so it's not bouncing against the back of the couch.
